I have worked in US Department of Transportation's Volpe National Transportation Systems Center for over 30 years, primarily in the area of organization development. Being part of fee-for-service government agency, we at Volpe work on a wide range of projects for clients at all levels of government (e.g., federal, state, MPO, local). My experience spans projects such as helping a state DOT and MPO find ways to collaborate more effectively around freight issues, serving as a neutral third-party resolving conflict among a wide range of parties near a large port, conducting a formal program evaluation of a rail trespass prevention program, and assessing the effectiveness of regional transportation security cooperation in a large metropolitan area. I particularly enjoy making sense of complex, messy systems and people issues, and bringing together stakeholders with diverse viewpoints to reach common ground. I have a master's degree in regional planning from UNC in Chapel Hill, and doctorate in applied behavioral science from MIT. In the last six years I've had increasing opportunity to apply my skills to freight-related issues. With increasing national attention to freight, I expect that to continue.
